## RE: REQUEST FOR 18-MONTH EXTENSION AND REDESIGNATION OF TEMPORARY PROTECTED STATUS FOR YEMEN

Dear Acting Secretary Wolf:

On behalf of the 129 undersigned faith-based organizations and faith leaders from across traditions, we call on you to extend Temporary Protected Status (TPS) for Yemen for 18 months and redesignate to protect as many lives as possible from Yemen's brutal conflict and humanitarian crisis. Our call is rooted in our country's interfaith values. The Quran teaches: "They love those who emigrated to them and find not any desire in their hearts of what the emigrants were given, but rather give them preference over themselves, even though they are in privation. Whoever is protected from the greediness of his own soul, then those will be successful." Similarly, the Torah commands, "You shall have one standard for stranger and citizen alike: for I the LORD am your God."

A failure to extend TPS for Yemen for 18 months and redesignate would go against basic principles of human dignity, justice, and mercy. Nearly 1,500 Yemeni nationals currently hold TPS.<sup>3</sup> Yemen was first designated for TPS in 2015 in response to the escalating violence in the country, which erupted in the summer of 2014 when the Houthis began their takeover of Yemen, sparking a civil war.<sup>4</sup> The war has created one of the most appalling humanitarian crises in the world, which prompted the 2018 18-month extension of TPS.<sup>5</sup> Today, Yemen is in its fifth year of brutal war and conditions for Yemeni civilians continue to deteriorate. As of September 2019, Yemen remains "the worst humanitarian crisis in the world."<sup>6</sup> Over three-quarters of the population, some 24.1 million Yemenis, urgently need humanitarian assistance.<sup>7</sup> More than 3.6 million people are displaced in Yemen.<sup>8</sup> Since the beginning of the conflict, at least 6,827 civilians have been killed and more than 10,000 wounded.<sup>9</sup> Every month, bombs and disease kill or injure approximately 37 children.<sup>10</sup>

"I am trying my best to support my family in Yemen and at the same time I am thinking about the rest of the people in Yemen who have no support. I am trying to get my family out. Look at what is happening there. There is nothing to eat. It is not

safe. People die every day, especially in the city I came from. Without TPS, I would be lost [...] It isn't that I don't want to go back. I can't go back. People are suffering there. Please try to put yourself in my position. We are human. We are all the same.

What could happen to me today maybe could happen to you tomorrow."

In addition to the devastating impact of the civil war, there is mass hunger across the country: 24.1 million—80 percent of individuals—are at risk of disease and hunger, with 14.2 million in need of "acute" assistance. Approximately 20 million people are food insecure, with a quarter of a million on the verge of starvation. Experts warn that Yemen is "one step" away from famine. Currently, 17.8 million people lack safe water and sanitation, and 19.7 million lack adequate health care. Upwards of 78 percent of Yemenis are in poverty, with women being more severely affected.

Diseases such as diphtheria and measles have also spread across multiple governorates, <sup>16</sup> and these outbreaks are likely to worsen as the war continues. The Yemeni people continue to face one of the worst cholera epidemics ever recorded, with more than one million documented cases so far. <sup>17</sup> From the beginning of 2019 through July 2019, Yemen reported 845,017 cholera cases with 1,234 deaths. <sup>18</sup> Bombing and conflict affect at least half of Yemen's hospitals and health care facilities. <sup>19</sup> There is also intentional targeting of public water systems in military action, meaning there is little hope of stopping the outbreak. <sup>20</sup> Overall, the humanitarian crisis has harmed children most severely; according to Save the Children, more than 130 Yemen children die each day from hunger and disease. <sup>21</sup>

In addition to health care, water, and sanitation systems, other vital infrastructure has been ruined.<sup>22</sup> In the 2017 extension and redesignation of TPS for Yemen, the U.S. government cited that half of children in Yemen are unable to attend school because of the destruction or military takeover of buildings.<sup>23</sup> The country is riddled with landmines, which prevent access to vital infrastructure, and water and food sources.<sup>24</sup>

Failure to extend and redesignate TPS for Yemen would risk the lives of thousands of our neighbors as Yemen remains consumed by war. We implore you to think about the moral imperative to love our neighbor and welcome the sojourner, particularly those fleeing violence.
